


Hi Jonathan,

Thanks for offering this thread of conversation, Rob and Jonathan.

Rob, really enjoyed your insightful comment about DeGroote's paintings, which I admire but hadn't articulated the analogy of his aesthetic to Zen aesthetics before now. I have only a passing acquaintance with DeGroote's pop art Japanese "iki" aesthetic and will take a closer look. His work is hard to find here. My minor for my doctorate is Japanese Buddhist aesthetics, so this insight of yours bears closely on my work. My major is art history viewed through an interdisciplinary lens grounded theoretically in Jungian depth psychology, so the entire conversation caught my interest. Great to meet a few fellow poets here who share both my Buddhist-Taoist aesthetic sensibilities and appreciate the "numinous" in poetics.

Jonathan, love the opening quote from Dante on art following nature and being in effect "God's child." That's one of my favorite quotes from the Inferno, and perfectly on point as illustrative of the numinous in mythopoeic literature. I also appreciate the dedication you have to the art of calligraphy. I had a chance recently to try my hand at it, taught by the contemporary Japanese master, Ron Nakasone, one of my mentors in Japanese aesthetics. I was embarrassed by my poor results!
