Sandra Teresa Hyde is an Associate Professor at McGill University in Montréal in the Department of Anthropology, who trained in Public Health before coming to Medical Anthropology. She is also an Associate Fellow in the Departments of Social Studies of Medicine and East Asian Studies, and affiliated with Global Mental Health and Transcultural Psychiatry in the Faculty of Medicine. Her current project is a manuscript titled -- Chasing the Dragon: Hybrid Socialism, Affective Politics and the Chinese Malleable Addict – based on eight years of ethnographic research in the first therapeutic residential drug treatment center in China. Her two previous books, published by the University of California, are: Eating Spring Rice: The Cultural Politics of AIDS in Southwest China (2007), and Postcolonial Disorders: Ethnographic Studies in Subjectivity (2008), co-edited with Mary-Jo DelVecchio Good, Sarah Pinto, and Byron Good. Her recent articles are the 2019 "Beyond China's Drug Century: Yunnan's First Therapeutic Community and Narratives of Drug Treatment and Mental Health Care," a Special Issue on Eco-social Approaches to Global Mental Health for Transcultural Psychiatry, Vol. 56(3), and in 2020 as Editor of the Special Issue, "Balancing the Quotidian: Precarity, Care and in Pace in Anthropology's Storytelling," for Medical Anthropology: Cross-Cultural Studies in Health and Illness, Vol. 39 (4). Her new project, Engendering Biomedicine, is a narrative history of four female medical school classmates who trained at Girton College, Cambridge University in the 1950s. Her recent fellowships include a 2017 Bellagio Academic Writing Fellowship in Italy and a 2019 Nova Scotia Health Foundation (formerly AMS) Oral History Grant.
