1) Indigenous and Developmental Psychology – This research area of interest is the link between culturally responsive learning environments for whānau Māori and school transitions; developmental assessment and longitudinal research with whānau Māori (Māori families).

2) Autobiographical Memory– This research focuses on autobiographical memory and cognition in whānau Māori.

3) Language Research – This research places emphasis on the orthographical transparency of Te Reo (Māori language) and the opaque features of the English language respectively.

4) Māori Paediatric Health – This research area of interest addresses prior work that was initiated from a longitudinal neurological-developmental study on whānau and the developmental outcomes on Māori infants who were exposed to either organic or chemical substances whilst in utero.

I know my main trunk line of work focuses on working with whānau Māori. However, I am just as keen to work alongside other indigenous scholars who work in similar areas and with their community.
